What is Decision to Discipleship?

DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP is a year-long experience in learning and practicing the life seen in Jesus Christ. Its six eight-week phases are designed to help you develop a dynamic Christian Lifestyle.

Discipleship is defined as a lifestyle of practical faith in Jesus Christ and willing obedience to his commands. It is a life of love and good works which aims in all things to glorify God and to help others also to become disciples and witnesses. Jesus said the greatest commandments were, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength," and "Love your neighbor as yourself" (Mk. 12:30-31). "If you love me, you will do what I command" (Jn. 14: 15). "Whoever claims to live in him must walk as Jesus did" (1 Jn. 2:6). "To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps" (1 Pet. 2:21). "And the things which you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others" (2 Tim. 2:2).

Why a Discipleship Program?

Many Christians either are not growing or have no effective ministry for Christ. Many of us find we need help especially in setting priorities, living a life of worship, experiencing true Christian fellowship, developing personal disciplines, discovering spiritual gifts, witnessing to others, and managing resources of time and money. These needs are more critical today than in the past because of the pressure-packed world we live in. We all need help in

developing a truly Christian lifestyle, and we recognize that none of us has enough discipline to achieve this alone. We must help each other!

Discipleship can't be programmed. But a discipleship program such as this can provide the framework in which discipleship becomes a reality.

Objectives |

Decision to Discipleship aims to raise up a corps of committed disciples who:

- 1. know and understand the Bible and have memorized key portions of it;
- 2. are Spirit-filled and Spirit-led;
- have developed a lifestyle of obedience to the Word of God;
- have had basic training in evangelism and have become effective witnesses;
- 5. have discovered and begun to exercise their spiritual gifts;
- are reproducing themselves through making disciplemakers; and
- are experiencing true Christian sharing or koinonia.

How?

It takes years of the Holy Spirit's work in a person's life to accomplish these objectives fully. But DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP provides a concrete tool for opening up one's life to the discipling ministry of the Spirit and the Word.

Initially the disciple commits himself to Phase One, lasting eight weeks. This is a serious commitment. To begin, the disciple must accept the Discipleship Covenant and seek conscientiously to fulfill it. To continue in the

program, the covenant must be renewed at the beginning of each eight-week phase.

There are three basic parts to DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP as it functions from week to week:

- 1. Discipleship Cell -- The small-group meeting of two to five disciples with the discipler. This is a weekly one-to-two-hour training session for the purpose of informal sharing, prayer, Bible study, and talking over assignments and projects.
- 2. One-on-One Sharing -- A weekly one-to-one encounter between the discipler and disciple for the purpose of review, prayer, discussion, and personal application of material studied.
- 3. Individual Study and Application —
 This is time the disciple spends on his own in completing Bible studies contained in this Manual, memorizing assigned Scriptures, reading, and putting assignments into practice.

Normally DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP requires a minimum of seven hours per week for the disciple (Discipleship Cell, 2 hours; One-on-One, 1 hour; Individual Study and Application, 4 hours). The discipler will spend about seven hours per week working with one disciple, and should allow an additional two hours per week for each additional disciple.

The Discipleship Covenant

Convinced that God is calling me to a life of fuller discipleship, I commit myself to Phase One of the DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP program, and will endeavor faithfully to fulfill the following disciplines:

- A minimum of one hour per week with the discipler.
- Faithful participation in the Discipleship Cell.

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INTRODUCTORY SESSION 1



Thinking Discipleship

This is the first of two introductory sessions designed to acquaint you more fully with the philosophy and materials of the DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP ministry.

THINKING REDEMPTIVELY

Disciples of Jesus Christ should be

Read 2 Corinthians 5:16 - 6:2 and answer the following questions:

- 1. Why is it that as Christians we now "regard no one from a worldly point of view"? From what point of view should we look at other persons?
- 2. What did God give us when he reconciled us to himself? (Note verse 18.)
 - 3. In what ways are we Christ's ambassadors?
- 4. When is the right time for a person to come to God? What is our part in helping people come to God?

In this passage Paul is describing the ministry he and his co-workers had among the Corinthians. In reconciling us to himself, God gave us all the message of reconciliation so we can have

a reconciling ministry in the world. We are Christ's ambassadors; God's fellow workers. Therefore we should strive to be redemptive in all we say and do.

REDEMPTIVE LIVING

You are encouraged to be constantly aware of the needs of others. These needs will include spiritual needs. Watch for opportunities to help those in need, and take advantage of these opportunities. Think and act redemptively.

The discipleship materials contain several disciplines to aid you in redemptive living. These include a planning calendar and a prayer record form (which will be explained in the next session). One of the most important aids to redemptive living and thinking will be the time you spend regularly with your discipler. You will meet regularly with him and other disciples in the Discipleship Cell, and you will spend time privately with him weekly for prayer, sharing, and work assignments. There may also be informal fellowship times apart from these weekly sessions. Through these times, talking about God and all he is doing will eventually become as natural as talking about the weather.

Redemptive living means talking not only about God, but also to God -- and listening to him. Praying together is one of the keys to real discipleship. MUCH PRAYER - MUCH POWER.



INTRODUCTORY SESSION 2



Using the Tools

A certain man had a beautiful workshop in his home. It was well lighted and colorfully painted. He had a well-equipped work bench with a vise and two mounted power saws. Neatly arranged on the wall was a wide assortment of tools -- screwdrivers, wrenches, saws, hammers, pliers, drills, chisels.

The man kept his workshop neat and tidy. Everything was always in its place. There was only one problem: He never used the tools for anything! They were just for looks.

We don't want this to happen with DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP. Use the tools! This lesson will show you how, and will make growth in discipleship orderly and progressive. Tools are most effective when used the way they were designed to be used!

THE DISCIPLESHIP MANUAL

The Discipleship Manual contains everything you will need for the first eight weeks of DECI-SION TO DISCIPLESHIP. This material is all part of Phase One. You will note that there are dividers also for the other five phases. Material for these phases will be added as needed.

Each week you will be using the following tools:

Introductory Session 2 - b
Topic Introduction

The first page each week will introduce the topic for the week. It will state the purpose of that week's lesson and explain how to proceed.

Weekly Assignment

Each week an assignment will be given.
This is to be completed before the next Discipleship Cell meeting. It will include Bible study
and some means of applying what is learned.
Occasionally it will include reading from books
or other sources. The discipler may add to or
modify these assignments as he feels is best
for each disciple. Since individuals differ,
the assignments may need to be adapted to different individual needs.

Bible Study Outline

A different Bible study for each of the eight weeks is provided. The disciple is to complete the study each week on his own. The study may then be discussed with the discipler during the One-on-One Session, or in the Discipleship Cell.

Bridge-Building Opportunity

Each week's lesson will include a "bridge-building opportunity" -- a suggested way to be in redemptive contact with other persons. Week by week you will be building bridges to non-Christians. At the proper time the Spirit will help you cross those bridges and lead people to Christ.

Prayer Record Form

"Much Prayer - Much Power!" These words at the top of the prayer record form emphasize a key element of discipleship. Day by day, you should record requests that come to your attention -- especially matters of prayer that are shared in the Discipleship Cell. As the date of each request and the date of the answers

are recorded, God's work in the lives of the disciples will be clearly seen.

Weekly Planner - "Planning - To Live Redemptively"

This sheet has spaces for each day of the week. It is an aid to redemptive living. Its purpose is twofold. First, it is a tool to help you organize and discipline your life so that your use of time will really reflect your priorities. We give our time to the things that are important to us. Secondly, once you have worked out a pattern for your life, the planner can be used as a record to keep track of commitments and appointments.

Each disciple needs to work out his own schedule, breaking down the day into time periods that correspond to his commitments, or writing in times when certain things are to be done. There is a place to check each day for daily devotions, bridge-building contacts, church commitments, and contacts made with new persons. "Timothy Call" means a daily informal contact with a prayer partner or fellow disciple, whether by telephone or in person. "Salvation by Appointment" means a definite time of presenting the Gospel to a non-Christian.

Scripture Memory Card

The Scripture Memory Packet contains a verse for each week. The verses are printed in the Authorized Version (King James) and in the New International Version.

Each week's verse corresponds to the topic of that week. It is essential that you memorize one verse each week, and that you constantly review verses learned. When you have memorized all 48 verses, you will have with you always key Scriptures relating to every area of your life. These are not verses just for evangelism, but passages which speak of God's total work in our lives.

Introductory Session 2 - d

Use the eight verses that go with Phase One, one verse at a time. Carry the verse packet with you for practice and review. The remaining verses will be used as you proceed through phases two through six.

Use the tools intelligently and faithfully -- to the glory of God.

1. Assurance of Salvation

INTRODUCTION


"Fear not!"

2. Feeding on the Word

INTRODUCTION

Jesus, the Word of God, was made flesh and lived among us. Through his Spirit he has given us the written Word, the Bible. Jesus speaks to us today through his Spirit, and through the written Word.

We must feed on the Word daily if we are to live. A once-a-week banquet is not enough! The wise Christian is one who stores up the Word in his heart, and who uses it in his daily life. This week's work will help you feed on the Word.

3. Developing A Quiet Time

INTRODUCTION

Jesus himself needed time alone with the Father, away from the crowds and even away from his disciples. He spent time alone with God, because pleasing God and doing his will were the most important things in his life.

Twentieth-century disciples especially need quiet times with God. Crowded schedules and pressing demands tend to soak up all our time. Therefore we must set aside time to be alone with the Father, and we must develop this time into a vital part of our relationship with God.

INTRODUCTION


We worship God because he is holy. No one else is worthy of the worship we give to God. Worship is not just something we do on Sundays, but it is our loving, reverent response to God day by day. So Paul says, "Whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God" (1 Corinthians 10:31, NIV).

This week we emphasize two dimensions of worship: prayer and praise. The two go together. Daily we pray to God, and daily we praise him for himself and for his wonderful works in the world. A disciple is one who has encountered God through Jesus Christ, who therefore knows who God is, and who in response lives a life of prayer and praise.


Bridge Building Opportunity

Report to your discipler this week the progress you are making in establishing a regular and systematic time for personal devotions. (See last week's Bridge-Building Opportunity work.)






INTRODUCTION

The basic secret of the Church's growth is so simple that we often miss it. The secret is in Christians telling others about Jesus and what he is doing in their lives. That's witnessing.

Just as the Father sent Jesus, so Jesus sends us to be his witnesses. The whole divine plan for the Gospel's conquest of the world is simple: Go tell others! Gossip about Jesus! Make disciples. All power has been given to Jesus (Matthew 28:18), and he gives us the power of his Spirit to be his witnesses (Acts 1:8).


6. The Holy Spirit

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
7. A Clear Conscience

One cannot be led by the Spirit unless he is committed to Jesus and ready to obey. True discipleship is a dynamic mixture of a will to obey God, a heart that loves God, and a mind that understands God's will. The Holy Spirit will lead us if we let him do his work in us.





3. Arranging Priorities


INTRODUCTION



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4. The Disciplined Life

INTRODUCTION

It is impossible to achieve God's goal for your life in your own strength. Only the Holy Spirit can produce acceptable fruit in your life. Scripture, however, gives us this principle: "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; for God is at work in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure" (Phil. 2:12-13, RSV). Here are the steps:

- 1. Determine your life goal.

- Work out a regular discipline which will help you achieve your goal and which reflects your priorities.

Men and women were created in the image of God. Each person is a unity of body, mind, and spirit. The beauty and harmony of the physical body reflect something of the glory of God.



Bridge Building Opportunity

Over-indulgence or abuse of the body in the area of exercise, diet, sleep, etc. are spiritual issues. Read the article by Dr. Paul Yardy on "Stewardship of Life."

Review with your discipler plans for implementing a needed diet or exercise plan suited to your individual needs. Involvement in the same (jogging, exercise, athletics, etc.) with a non-Christian friend might provide an opportunity for Christian witness and your concern for bringing all of life under the Lordship of Jesus Christ.



Christian discipleship must include the concept of stewardship. The idea that man and woman are stewards of God is intrinsic in the creation story (Gen. 1-3), in which they are appointed lords of all things.

In the New Testament Jesus told parables to emphasize and to illustrate man's role as a steward. A steward is one who is entrusted with the affairs and possessions of his master. The lessons make clear that a good steward is one who takes his responsibility seriously and is faithful (1 Cor. 4:2). In the broadest sense, Christian stewardship includes all of life and not merely money, talent, and possessions. It is from this angle that we should see our stewardship of the physical aspect of our persons.

A human being is a composite of multiple, intricately inter-related qualities. These include biological, physiological, emotional, rational, spiritual, and social dimensions. (A good book to read which deals with some of these aspects is Dr. McMullen's None of These Diseases.)

Much understanding about our physical needs and about the best way to care for those needs can be gleaned from the Bible. For instance, the principle set forth in the Ten Commandments of six days of work, followed by a day of rest and worship, recognizes our need for cyclic renewal. To ignore this need is to invite injury to one's health. Likewise, the moral principle of the sacredness of sex and the demand for marital fidelity, if universally practiced, would free mankind of the ravages of venereal diseases. Scriptural warnings against gluttony (Titus 1:12) no doubt have spiritual overtones, but they also carry implications of

the dangers of overweight. Scripture uses the analogy that our body is a temple wherein dwells our personhood and where God's Spirit comes and dwells with us. We should take extra care that nothing be allowed to defile that temple (1 Cor. 3:16, 17).

Physical health is the basis for realizing other human values, not a substitute for them. There is a biblical principle that recognizes a hierarchy of values. What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world (including a high level of physical fitness) and loses his own soul? Jesus even challenged his disciples to risk their health if need be for the sake of the Kingdom.

In our pursuit of the fountain of youth we must ever be mindful of the fact that "it is appointed unto man once to die." The aging process is at work in every one of us, starting to some degree at the time of our birth. With these concepts in mind we should keep our motives, goals, priorities, and sense of destiny in proper balance as we give attention to our physical health, as good stewards of the Lord.

Modern medical science offers many well-documented rules for ensuring an optimum state of well-being. The good Christian steward will recognize that these blessings from science are really part of the wonderful providences of God and will try to keep abreast of current health concepts.

It would be well to mention now several areas where science has accumulated much data and has developed ways and means to help us enjoy a high level of health. These include ways to avoid threats to our health. Prevention of disease, diet and nutrition, obesity, exercise needs, recreation, and some harmful vices of our culture are areas to be noted.

Prevention is always better than cure.

There are a number of immunization agents available from your doctor to assist in building body defenses against disease. Be sure these are current. Much knowledge in the area of nutrition is available to indicate that our food should be more of the wholesome, natural form. Highly refined sugars and flour should be kept at a minimum. This is true of the saturated fats. Lack of plenty of the natural grain fiber in our food may be the basis of a number of diseases plaguing civilized societies. A diet too high in animal protein is thought to have some disease-producing potential.

The fat person runs a higher risk of falling prey to many conditions which are not as likely to afflict the lean person. These include diabetes, back problems and arthritis, arteriosclerosis of blood vessels, heart disease, high blood pressure, and a shorter life span. It is important to lay aside every weight which would beset us (Hebrews 12:1).

Physical fitness is defined as the ability to carry out daily tasks with vigor and alertness, without undue fatigue, and with ample energy to enjoy leisure time pursuits and to meet unforeseen emergencies. This level of fitness,

obviously, will vary with the individual's lifestyle and occupation. Not everyone needs to maintain a level of fitness to enable him to climb Mount Everest. The person whose occupation is a sedentary one would do well to follow some prescribed exercise. The affluent individual often avoids utilitarian types of chores, work, and modes of transportation because of status Instead, he is inclined to turn to connotations. the sophisticated fads of jogging or timeconsuming sports. One wonders if the weight lifter who labors to develop the body contours of a Mr. Atlas isn't motivated more by pride than a sense of Christian stewardship of the "temple for the Holy Spirit."

Recreation and play are big business in the USA. The Christian disciple must ever be sure that his play time is truly recreative in character, and never destructive. When play recreates it helps to fit one for larger service. Too often sports become a matter of idolatry because of its all-consuming demand on time, thought, and priorities.

Medical science has now accumulated much data which clearly establishes a case against some of our culture's vices. Under the checks of the Spirit serious followers of Christ discarded practices long before such data was available. The use of tobacco in any form would best be struck from the book of the Christian disciple. Cancer, heart disease, lung crippling vascular problems are too often the result of the use of tobacco. According to medical science, alcohol is a depressant and effects the body in just the opposite way that Scripture demands. Man is commanded to be in control of his body and to be

sober-minded. To talk about the temperate use of alcoholic beverages is a delusion. The beverage itself deprives the individual of his own powers to make a judgment as to when the line is crossed between a hypothetical point of temperance and that of excessive indulgence. When it comes to the matter of alcoholic beverages, it seems very clear that complete abstinence is the only rule to go by in this modern century. Alcohol is in effect a poison to the body.

Finally, we can say that except for times of sickness or injury, the best health is that which is least compulsively preoccupied with itself.


Likewise, the best exercise, recreation, nutrition, and the like are those patterns of life which are least compulsively preoccupied with health and are most welcomed for their own sake. Even when there are disabilities about which nothing can be done, it is best to adapt to them and learn to live with them as God asked Paul to do with the thorn in his flesh. This frees the individual to give more attention to the matters of the spirit and service to others.

Remember John's prayer for Gaius, "I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you, even as your soul is getting along well" (3 John 2).

7. Poverty and Riches


INTRODUCTION

Jesus was poor in worldly wealth, and yet he gave more to the world than any of the rich men of his generation. He was the richest of all, but for our sakes he gave up his throne to become poor.

God's continual response to the needy of the world is one of compassion. Jesus is deeply "touched with the feeling of our infirmities" (Hebrews 4:15). His concern for the poor is our burden too.

Most of us don't consider ourselves rich. But in comparison with world needs, we are the wealthy of the earth. Part of our discipleship is answering biblically the questions of poverty and riches.




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Where Do I Fit in God's Family?

AS YOU BEGIN PHASE THREE

How are the relationships in your life? Good? Bad? Complicated?

We are social persons, made to live in relationship with others. For the Christian, the question of the *kind* of relationships we have is crucial.

Look at Jesus. His life was not without conflict. But he was always perfectly in his Father's will. His life and relationships give us a model for all our relationships with other people. The Word of God shows us how to build and sustain helpful, healthful relationships.

The first part of Phase Three deals with relationships in society and especially in the Christian community, the Church. You will then study what the Bible says about other relationships -- between individuals, in marriage, and in the home.

A basic resource for this phase is H. Norman Wright's book, Communication: Key to Your Marriage. This book has been included with your Phase Three manual pages.

Review the Discipleship Covenant on the next page, and sign it if you have not already done so. You are now ready to begin Phase Three.

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1. Man and Woman in God's Image

INTRODUCTION

Genesis 1:27 tells us, "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them." Human-kind was created as male and female -- in the image of God.

This means that in some very crucial ways, men and women are like God. In fact, it means that man and woman together make up the image of God. Some aspects of God's nature are more evident in a man; some are more obvious in a woman. God is a trinity of divine persons in mutual fellowship, yet one God. He made human beings to live in community, to be different from each other and yet to need each other. So it is important -- especially today -- for Christians to understand what it means to be a man or woman in the Body of Christ.

Sin distorts and degrades the relationship between the sexes. The image of God is marred in all of us. But God's plan through Christ is that we all together should grow up into Christ, that we should be conformed to Jesus' likeness (Eph. 4:13-15, Rom. 8:29). In the Church, says Paul, we are neither Jew nor Greek, neither slave nor free, neither male nor female, but we are all one in Christ (Gal. 3:28).

So this is where we begin with Phase Three. We can be properly, wholesomely, and lovingly

related to each other in the Body of Christ because each of us bears God's image, and in each of us that image is being renewed through the work of Jesus' Spirit in us.

Your assignments this week start at this key point as we consider the question, "Where do I fit in God's family?"


Remember that every person -- even the "worst sinner" -- has been made in God's image. There is "something of God" in every person. And Jesus died for every person. These are the two reasons why it is possible for any person to become a Christian, if he or she will respond to God's Spirit.

So the first fact in presenting the Gospel is not, "We all are sinners." That is the second fact. The first is: "We all are made in God's image."

Try to look at each person you see this week as someone who bears, in some way, the image of God. Share with at least one person that God loves him or her, and that he/she was created in God's image.

2. Living in Community

INTRODUCTION

We were built for community, for sharing our lives with others, for what the New Testament calls koinonia. This Greek word refers to the shared life which believers have in common.

The Church is the community of God's people. It is the Body of Christ in which each believer is related to, and depends upon, the other believers. So living the Christian life means living in community.

There are three parts to a healthy church's life: Worship, community, and ministry. But a church's worship and its ministry will be no stronger than its fellowship, its life-in-community. And the example of Jesus with his disciples shows that discipleship grows best in community.

The picture given in Acts 2-5 is not intended as a detailed pattern for the Church to follow today. This was the first experience of the Jerusalem Church; later we read of the Church in Antioch (Acts 13) and in other places. In some details, these churches were quite different.


But all experienced community. The important thing today is that the Church rediscover the meaning of Christian community that the early church knew.

(Note, incidentally, that Acts 2 and 4 don't say that all believers sold all their possessions. The point is that resources were shared, and believers did whatever was necessary so that no one was in need.)

INTRODUCTION

The over-arching principle for all who take the yoke of Christ is the principle of mutual submission -- being servants to one another. And Jesus is our great model for submission as we see in John 13 and Philippians 2.

Submitting to one another is part of Christian discipleship lived out in community.

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

4. God's Plan for the Family

INTRODUCTION

The two most basic forms of community in the Bible -- and in society -- are the family and the Church. Both together are part of God's over-all plan. Therefore discipleship in the Church must not be divorced from discipleship in the home.

Like the Church, the family is not primarily an institution or organization. It is a community of persons bound together by love and mutual commitment. The form of the family may vary somewhat in different cultures, but its strength and soundness depend on cooperating with God's plan.

5. The Roles of Husband and Wife

INTRODUCTION

Marriage is a covenant relationship. A man and a woman marry because they love each other, but the test of true love is whether it is willing to make long-range commitments. Much of our social fabric is coming apart because people no longer tie love and commitment together.

A covenant is an act of faith. It is an act of the will, not just a moving of the emotions. A husband loves and serves his wife not just because he feels like it, but because he is committed to her. And so also a wife with her husband.

In the marriage covenant, a man and a woman commit themselves to fulfill the roles of husband and wife. Discipleship in marriage involves understanding these roles and commitment to them -- in love.

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



Lifestyle is a concern all the way through DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP. This week's focus emphasizes that family lifestyle is a part of discipleship.



2. Telling My Story

INTRODUCTION

Is witnessing telling what God has done for the world, or what he has done especially in my life?

Both. A Christian witness doesn't just tell about his own personal experiences; he points to Jesus Christ who has acted in his life. Or, put the other way: A witness tells not only that Jesus came into the world to save sinners, but goes on to relate how Jesus has changed his own life.


If the Church is to be faithful in fulfilling our Lord's commission to make disciples in all nations, we must move beyond mere addition of disciples to the multiplication of disciples.

5. Spiritual Warfare

INTRODUCTION

You have already discovered that serving God faithfully puts you in a battle. The Bible calls the forces which are warring against God and his Kingdom "principalities and powers" or "rulers and authorities." Discipleship means joining in the war for the Kingdom of God -- but with joy and confidence, for Jesus Christ has already conquered!

God's great bulwark and weapon against the powers of darkness is the Church, the Body of Christ. This, again, is why discipleship is so important in the spiritual warfare we all face. We must be the Church, the community of God's people, in actual fact.

As you memorize Scripture this week, take some extra time to meditate on the verses you have learned. The Word is part of your equipment in your spiritual warfare. Ask God to lead you to someone this week who needs to see Jesus. Then act as God leads.

6. Social Witness

INTRODUCTION

As you have studied the Bible, you have seen that God is concerned with all peoples and nations — with the whole created order — not just with the personal salvation of individual persons.

God's reconciling work centers in the personal redemption which Jesus brings to persons, but it reaches to healing and reconciliation between groups, races, classes, and nations, and between humankind and the natural world.

The Church must have a social witness. Some believers are especially called to important ministries of reconciliation in the world of today's pressing social problems. This is basic and a crucial part of Kingdom work.

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Hebrews 8-10

7. Groups for Mission

INTRODUCTION

Ecclesiastes 4:9 says, "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their work" (NIV). And Jesus says, "Where two or three come together in my name, there am I with them" (Matthew 18:20 NIV).

Christianity is not a solitary religion but a social faith. Christians together make up the Body of Christ, the community of God's people. And they can accomplish more for God's work by joining together in small groups for ministry than they can ever do separately.

This week's study looks at an added dimension of being a discipleship cell -- forming a cell aimed at a specific mission or ministry in the world.

8. The Church as Counterculture

INTRODUCTION

What in the world is the Church? Jesus prayed that the Church should always be in the world but never be of the world.

Too often we see the Church either trying to get away from the world, or becoming more and more like the world. But we are to be related to the world as a counterculture. We are to be so closely tied to Jesus Christ that we can have a transforming impact on our world.

This is possible only if the Church is a close-knit "alternate community" to what the world knows and experiences. The purpose of DECISION TO DISCIPLESHIP has been to help build a Christian counterculture -- a group of people who live now by the values of the Kingdom of God.

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
